#### GENERAL REPORT - 1979

I hope to make this  $r_e$ port interesting, because it was an interesting year for the library and staff.

We concentrated more on public relations this year, with a return of

many favorable comments and much good-will for the library.

Our "Year of the Child" celebration was high-lighted with a photographic display of Flin Flon area children by Glen Campbell Studios. (We hope to incorporate this as an on-going event, with family pictures on display every month.) A sincere thank you to Glen Campbell and staff!

Flin Flon Nursery schools were invited to bring their small charges for an afternoon at the library, with children's cartoons brought in from Brandon University, and ice-cream and cookies served. Note of interest: with an attendance of close to one hundred, not one mitt, scarf, or boot was mislaid!

Presentation of prizes for the "Year of the Child" poster and essay contest took place at a "Dress-Up" party. Children's cartoons, and a special "story-telling" session by Joan Edwards, was enjoyed by children and staff alike.

One problem - it was almost too successful, with over twice the number of children attending than was expected! We moved a little faster, cut the cake a little smaller, and hopefully, no one was disappointed!

A book display for children and parents, appropriate posters, and give-aways of book-marks, balloons, and coloring sheets completed the program.

Our visiting author for Manitoba Library Event was Nan Shipley - a warm, friendly person, who has written many books about the North. M.C.'d by Val Hedman, in the relaxed atmosphere of the reading-room, and Miss Shipley herself, made this an interesting and enjoyable evening for the 35 ladies in attendance.

Further to the Manitoba Library Event program, an afternoon for Senior Citizens was sponsored, with a successful sale of their handicraft and art work. Newspapers dating back to the war years, and a display of favorite books was placed in the reading room. Coffee and dainties were served, with one dear little lady asking what the charge was!

A display of Manitoba paintings by the Winnipeg Art Gallery, in cooperation with the flin Flon Arts Council created a <u>lively</u> interest!

We consider ourselves fortunate to have an on-going sale display of Indian hand-craft and art work by Angelique Merasty, whose birch bark "bite" pictures are becoming widely known.

A Manitoba author display, give-away book-marks, library buttons - "Smile - You Have a Library" - Dewey Decimal cartoons, and colorful posters added to the event.

A "Christmas Gift" new book sale proved again to be popular with close to \$2,300.00 worth of books sold over a five week period.

Borrowing Anna-Grace Diehl's idea, Boissevain Library, we held a one day, pre-Christmas handicraft sale, with \$1,475.00 worth of items sold.

It had a two-fold effect - valuable good-will for the library, and awareness of the beautiful hand-craft and art work in our community.

We have had many requests for a repeat, and from this first attempt we have gained valuable information in making the next one even bigger and better!

An open-house carol afternoon put us all in the Xmas spirit, with Kay Uhrich, Joan Edwards, Kay Matzer, and our student-help, Gina, singing the old favorites, and two young men from the Flin Flon First Baptist Church, with guitar accompaniment, bringing us the new. Beautifully done! This is what Christmas is all about! Home-made doughnuts (thanks to Norma) an d coffee, added the finishing touch.

Hosted by the Library Board members, a seasonal staff dinner at the Flin Flon Hotel, was highly enjoyed, with the unanimous comment, "Let's do it

again!"

A tree-decorating party was enjoyed by the staff, with a brightly lit tree at the entrance, and a cookie-tree for the children, with cookies donated by Miss Ettinger's home-ec class from McIsaac Junior High, and our good-hearted Norma.

The library's Christmas gift to our patrons - an amnesty week for

all over-due books!

Combined with the fun part, of necessity, there was hard work. Early in the year, new shelving was set up, with much groaning and shifting of books and shelves.

Then we took to the ladders, ("going up in the world" was one comment heard!), to install new ceiling tiles (a great improvement).

Phyllis, our painter, manned the paint-brush for some needed touch-

ups.

New planters were ordered, with suitable plants purchased and installed by Doug Ormiston, one of our local florists. The staff undertook the repotting of our heritage rubber tree, (it is a Tree, not a plant!) with much comment and some assistance from reading-room patrons.

(A week later, a follow-up call from a gentleman present at the operation, enquiring if our tree had died! We were happy to assure him that it

was standing up and taking nourishment - doing just fine!)

During the summer months, all the books in the library were washed, repaired, etc., with books in the children's area color-coded for easier selection.

an inventory was undertaken to determine the number of books missing,

which totalled 337 for a two year period.

A round total of 1,161 books was placed in circulation during the year, after due process of accessioning, cataloguing, typing and filing approximately 4,000 cards.

Further to public relations, Bunny, my retired (?) assistant and I have submitted an entry in the John Cotton Dana Library Public Relations contest in New York. (We can dream!)

Saturday story-hours were divided into two age groups this year; one

hour for pre-schoolers, and an hour for the elementary-age group.

The programs were delightfully and capably arranged by two high-school students, Lynn Dinelle and Cindy Davidson, with a regular attendance of thirty-five children.

660 Book reports were written during the year for our column in the

Daily Reminder press.

Our continuous miscellaneous sale of book-bags, discard books, magazines, fire-logs from old newspapers, patterns, (anything within the law!) netted us a small profit of \$100.00.

Other credits from projector and film rentals, typing, totalled

\$225.00.

Through a memorial fund, a northern landscape scene painted by Joan Edwards, was hung in the library in memory of Mrs. Edna Doran, a dear library friend.

The library lost a staunch and valuable supporter with the retirement of Mr. Gunnar Folkestone after 20 years of service with the library board. He will be missed for his quiet humor , his business and finance ability, and his strong drive to accomplish.

For the knowledge and never-failing support which he gave me -

thank you, Mr. Folkestone.

To the chairman and members of the library board, your help and understanding is greatly appreciated.

To the staff of the Daily Reminder, and C.F.A.R. radio station, thank you for the excellent coverage in all our events.

Sincere thanks for all donations, books, plants, etc., and all the courtesies extended to us.

Finally, to my staff - thank you sincerely for all your help and consideration. One promise to you - in the library you will never be bored! Keep smiling!!
