## HEAD LIBRARIAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1982

In retrospect, the past year shows a good record of accomplishment. Sincere thanks and appreciation to the Library Staff who made this possible, and to the Library Board Members for their support on our endeavours.

An inventor, in August, led to a thorough weeding of outdated books in all sections, with a total of 3,757 books discarded. 1,576 new books were added to the collection, giving us a total housing of 22,460 volumes. Revisal of accession books was completed, and a correctional filing survey is now in process.

Media support included regular book report columns and program coverage in the "Daily Reminder" newspaper - a weekly radio program of Library news by Board Member, Del Baird - and a recent addition, the Weekly Television of our Story Hour Program by Romik Community Television.

We continued to fully support and promote local area artists, craftsmen, and authors with regular sale displays.

Library tours were requested by the schools, children's groups, adult education classes, and the Correctional Institute.

Varied programing for special events, including, Manitoba Library Events, National Book Festival, author visits and holidays, were an interesting part of the Library picture.

Sincere appreciation is extended to all those who have supported us by donations, volunteer help and encouragement.

In these days of recession, it becomes increasingly important, with whatever means we have at our disposal, to give our Library a bright and hopeful community image with "Free Reads, Sights and Sounds!"

#### FLIN FLON'S JUBILEE YEAR

Flin Flon is celebrating it's 50th Birthday in 1983.

A highlight of the festivities planned was the Lieutenant-Governor's Levee on February 12th. The Library was honored by a special visit preceeding The Levee when Her Honour, The Lt. Governor, expressed a desire to meet Angelique Merasty, famous for her "bite" pictures, three of which hang in Government House.

It was an enjoyable relaxed visit, for Board Members and staff, Bob Lowery and Murray Mackenzie, Free Press Representatives were present, with Murray interpreting for Angelique, who speaks only Cree.

We were all pleased with this added recognition of Angelique's talents. This shy little lady has brought beauty into the Library.

Flin Flon is the only city in North America to be named from an outof-print paperback - "The Sunless City" - published in 1905. Flin
Flon Library is fortunate to have one of the very few copies in
existence. To honour Flin Flon's Jubilee Year, the Library is offering a limited number of hard bound copies of "The Sunless City" available in March at \$12.95 per copy.

On the Jubilee year theme, the Library will be offering an interesting little cookbook, with family recipes dating back to the 1890's, donated by Library friends. Appropriately the book will be titled "Friends of the Library".

The Library has also been handling Jubilee Calendars, Placemats and Stationery since December with sales adding up to \$4,200.00.

Also at the Library to celebrate Flin Flon's Jubilee Year - 1983, a poster and essay competition is being promoted, with the children being asked to use their imagination and picture Flin Flon in its beginning - the 1930's . Cash prizes are being awarded by the Jubilee Committee to three categories, with a special award for pre-schoolers.

In line with our Jubilee Year as well as making use of our World Embassy File, the children are being asked to select a country they would like to correspond with. The theme is - "Tell The World About Flin Flon!" For each letter written, the Library will enclose a Flin Flon pamphlet, with mailing under our supervision.

#### ADULT SERVICES

Memberships total 7,086, with circulation remaining steady at a total of 48,107 books borrowed for the year.

59 magazines and newspapers are subscribed to, with 32 regular donations - re Scala - Panorama - Japan Pictorial, Saudi Arabia, etc.

Paperback donations form the major part of non-accessioned books, with a steady flow of borrowers. Complete housing - 1,025.

350 records were borrowed from our collection of 184 records, with additions planned for this year.

Through Public Library Service, Brandon Film Service, and National Film Board, 20 films were borrowed for community and library use.

Valuable assistance continues through Inter-Library Loans, with 64 books borrowed, and 14 loaned.

"University of the North" continuing education program is a definite asset, making available to the community a wide range of reference books.

Informational pamphlets from Consumers Education, Alcohol Foundation, Mental Health, Cancer program, and Muscular Dystrophy are displayed for easy access.

For cold weather escapists and dreamers, our travel file contains helpful information. Assorted tropical plants in our sunny reading room, add to the illusion:

As part of library service, we try to answer all questions and requests: e.g. - locate a book or poem with no author or title - only a rough outline, or one sentence! Sometimes we succeed!

Information requests vary from month to month, and all resources are used to fill these.

#### CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Children's Educational books and fantasy books are being geared to attract children and parents alike, and these are the books that are on our shelves, with new selections purchased regularly.

We have a reading selection of 6,579 books, and carry subscriptions to 5 children's magazines.

Thanks to a Toy donation by the Mental Retarded Association, we now have 76 Fisher-Price Toys and puzzles in our collection, with 584 items borrowed in the past year.

Children's records with selections covering nursery rhymes, song and dance, activity games, folk tunes, co-ordination records, Sherri and Bron, and fairy stories were popular loan items, with 140 borrowers.

17 Children's Films and Cartoons were borrowed for library and community use, through Public Library Service, Brandon Film Service, and National Film Board.

Under Trudie and Rhonda, the pre-schooler's Story Hour program continued to climb in popularity with a registration of 62 this year, an increase of 13 children, an all time high. Some of the highlights of this program were a dress-up Hallowe'en Party with everyone a prize-winner - mini-puppets in the form of witches and pumpkins donated by the Library. The Christmas party was a special treat with their own special Christmas cake decorated with Frosty The Snowman, and red and green pop-corn balls, thanks to Trudie and Rhonda. Christmas cartoons and gift books were supplied by the Library.

With the recent weekly televising of this program, supervision is now under the volunteer staff of Leslie McKeachnie, Nyda Maximchuk, Joan Edwards, and Mrs. Vickery. A sincere thank you to Trudie and Rhonda for their efforts in the past two years, and to our volunteers.

Story Hour creative art work has a place of honor in the Reading Room

window weekly, with jolly little snowmen, gingerbread men, and Winnie The Pooh's famous honey-pot bee - an added attraction to passer-by's.

One of the features of Manitoba Library Event was Nursery School Day, with 50 small day-care toddlers enjoying cartoons, dixie cups and animal cookies, with "smile" balloons and buttons for give-aways.

Summer reading programs with book prizes add interest to the long summer holidays.

Group visits by the schools and organizations are made welcome, with balloons, book-marks, and "Smile" pins for give-aways.

We enjoy having children in the Library, and each one receives special attention. (There is no lack of staff volunteers to cuddle small babies, while young mothers select books!)

Manitoba Library Event gave recognition to the men of Flin Flon with a display of their handicraft talents - a hand-crafted violin, carpentry precision tools, h.o. gauge miniatures, petit-point, paintings, drift-wood art, and a miniature hay-rack and team of farm horses by an 83 year old retired farmer.

A Christmas flower arranging program conducted by Rania Baker of Christie's: Florist was enthusiastically received with an attendance of 50. Door prizes were donated by Christie's Florists and Ormiston's Florists.

As an added feature this year, the library was a depositary for toys for the Elks Christmas Cheer Fund, with 60 toys donated. With each toy donated, the library contributed a children's book

A highlight of our Christmas programs this year was Christmas Carolling by the Senior Citizen's choir and Ruth Bett's school choir. The combination singing of the two age groups was a beautiful celebration of the Christmas season.

#### COMMUNITY SERVICES

- 1. One of our most worthwhile efforts is supplying books on a monthly loan basis to our Senior Citizens in the Northern Lights Manor and Hemlock Lodge.
- 2. In the past three months, in support of Flin Flon's Jubilee Year we have sold special calenders totalling \$4,185.00.
- 3. In May, 1982, with special assistance from Sue Lambert and Jamie Bridges, we were able to place in the Library an informational pamphlet of Flin Flon, prepared by Bunny Jones just in time for the Tourist Season! To date, at \$1.00 a copy we have sold 100.
- 4. We offer photocopying services to the public for a minimal fee giving us a profit this year totalling \$1,689.00.
- 5. Typing resumes, thesis, letters etc, is available, and books may be covered or repaired by our staff.
- 6. We also baby sit plants for residents travelling south for the winter, (giving us anxious moments and the need to check our libray book "Why Are My Leaves Turning Yellow!")
- 7. Special book ordering for hard-to-find books is also available.

#### STAFF ACTIVITIES

- 1. An enjoyable Weiner Roast was held at Kay Matzer's cabin, Beaver Lake, last June. The black flies were not biting yet, we had lots to eat - a little to drink - and good fun and conversation!
- 2. A Christmas dinner at the Flin Flon Hotel, followed by a gift swap and Christmas cheer at the Library, started us on the road for the holiday season. Gifts of chocolates and home baking from Board Members and Library patrons blinded us to weight control. As Trudie phrased it "We gorged ourselves!" and enjoyed every mouthful!
- 3. Miscellaneous staff activities: Emergency plumbing skills, repairing library drapes and toys, blowing up balloons, baking cakes and cookies for children's programs, reporting trees in the "reading room", preparing displays and making everyone feel welcome in the Library.
- 4. Custodian Kay Matzer plays an important role in the Library rising to every emergency while keeping us clean and shining. Thanks, Kay.
- 5. Main staff activity Work!
