#### Chairman's Report for 1997

During 1997 we regret that Charlie Mott resigned from the Board. However, the Board was pleased to accept the addition of Marlene Gregory as his replacement.

Significant progress was achieved in the automation of the Library. The Library entered into a partnership with the Greenstone Technology Committee whereby the Library computer system will be linked with the libraries of the Flin Flon schools through a radar dish communication system. This linkage will allow users of the system to search for books in any library in Flin Flon as well as have a direct connection to the Internet. A computer seating "pod" has been installed in the Library and at present contains two computers, a printer and a scanner. The overall installation is nearly complete.

In conjunction with this, Kathleen Delgatty (Friends of the Llbrary) has been using the Internet to research the computer usage policies developed in other libraries throughout North America. A policy committee has been set up and using this information as a guide, the Board and Kathleen are developing a policy document for the Flin Flon Library.

The computer installation involved the purchase of a new expanded Novell network system, 7 new computers, connecting signal wiring and an upgrade of the Library's wiring system to handle the additional current load.

To fund this work the Library received a grant from the Community Access Program of \$30 000. The library had to produce matching funds for this grant.

I would like to express my appreciation to Gretta Redahl, all the other members of the Staff and Kathleen Delgatty for their continued work to make the Flin Flon Library a leader in Manitoba.



#### **NEW DIRECTIONS**

Entering 1997, little did we know that the community of Flin Flon would be forced over the next months to re-examine where it was going as it never had before. In the case of the Library *every* plan in development and every plan envisioned was re-visited.

Globally, as everyone is aware ,there are unprecedented changes taking place in every walk of life-socially, economically ,politically and culturally. The mining community is no exception. This community is feeling the direct impact of these systemic changes because we are basically a single industry mining community.

In the past 18 months at the local level,the major employer Hudson Bay Mining & Smelting Company has made it clear to the community that , partly because of the emerging trends in the mining industry and partly because of global market pressures ,and partly because of a lack of ore reserves there is a need to conduct operations in a substantially different manner. The Company also made it clear that there is the potential that operations could cease in 2004 without major operational changes and significant changes in regard to historic relationships with any party in relationship with them.

The need for diversification within the local economy is an absolute necessity. In the worst case scenerio of HBM&S leaving Flin Flon, there will still be a community of Flin Flon. There *is* great hope and optimism that the operation of HBM&S will continue past 2004. Near completion is an agreement in operations, including a labor peace pact to provide a basis to seek additional needed financial backing in order to continue operations and ensure prosperity. The process of seriously looking at diversification of the local economy is not an easy one but absolutely mandatory.

The Library is currently examining its historical role and service base within this changing community dynamic. Because we are entering a knowledge based economy the services that the Library offers are a perfect fit to realize the skill development needs that are a top priority within in the community.

It is the belief of the Board of Directors that the role of the Library has actually been strengthened. To that end the Library is positioning itself to assume a leadership role within the community economic development process.

The Administrator's report therefore can only be looked at within the context of this reality. As a result of the Library having established very positive relationships within the community, the Library is in a position to contribute very positively to the local demands in these changing times.
